

## 15<sup>TH</sup> BRICS SUMMIT KEY MESSAGESS

## **BRIEF:**

The 15th Summit of BRICS nations – Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa will take place at the Sandton Convention Centre in Johannesburg from 22 to 24 August 2023 under the theme: *"BRICS and Africa: Partnership for Mutually Accelerated Growth, Sustainable Development and Inclusive Multilateralism"*. President Cyril Ramaphosa as Chair of BRICS for the year 2023 will chair the Summit.

It will be the first BRICS Summit to be hosted in person since the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic and the subsequent global restrictions. The leaders of Brazil, India, China and South Africa will attend the Summit.

By mutual agreement, President Vladimir Putin of the Russian Federation will not attend the Summit but the Russian Federation will be represented by Foreign Minister, Mr Sergey Lavrov.

BRICS is a group of leading emerging markets and developing countries. The first BRICS Summit took place in Yekaterinburg, Russia, in 2009. South Africa was invited to join in 2010 and attended its first Summit in Sanya, China, in 2011.

BRICS cooperation has grown over the last fifteen years to include an annual programme of over 160 meetings across the three pillars of political and security, economic and financial, and people-to-people cooperation, contributing to the sustainable development agenda, the development of humanity, and more fair global governance.

BRICS are responsible for 48 percent of the world's natural gas consumption.</li> <li>While renewable energy consumption is only 16 percent now, BRICS members commitment to mitigating climate change.</li> </ul>
